

Dear Paríshíoners,



There are a number of details in this weekend's Gospel for the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord that help us shape our interpretation of the passage. *"The <u>eleven</u> disciples went to Galilee."* Not **twelve**, but <u>eleven</u>. Judas is no longer among the company of those who represent the new Israel. This remains a painful reminder that not all of the followers of Jesus are perfect. We doubt. We drag our feet. Maybe we are not as courageous in carrying forth Jesus' saving mission into the world as we might be or should be. Yet, in spite of our weakness, Jesus has still empowered each and every one of us who call ourselves Christian to carry on His ministry. *His ministry will continue*.

The disciples went to Galilee. Galilee is where Jesus' saving mission began. *Is Galilee where it also ends?* Not really. However, these verses from Saint Matthew's Gospel ... Chapter 28 ... conclude his account. Note that there is no mention of the Ascension in these verses. Saint Matthew ends with the Great Commission to go and baptize: *"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and behold, I am with you always, to the close of the age"* (Mt 28:19-20). There is no end to Jesus' being with us because we are to take up His work and carry it – carry Him – forward for all time.

One final detail: Jesus ordered His disciples to a mountain ... a place in Scripture for divine encounter and divine revelation. *The encounter* ... Jesus promises to be with them *"until the close of the age."* His Presence is His farewell gift to the disciples. *The revelation* ... they are to take up His saving mission by making *"disciples of all nations"* through baptizing and teaching. The disciples are His farewell gift to the world. And by taking up His saving mission ... so are we.

It takes us a lifetime of following Jesus and proclaiming His Good News to learn how gifted we are and what a gift we are to others. What the disciples hadn't yet come to fully believe was that Jesus would always remain with them, giving them strength ... through the Spirit. There was a startling newness to what Jesus was doing and the message He was conveying. Never before had someone been present with them who *"fills all things in every way"* (Second Reading). Never before had someone so completely shared power. Never before had someone promised the most potent power – the Holy Spirit who is with us "until the end of the age."

The power given Jesus is now handed over to His disciples ... and the new thing about this power is that it is a divine Person ... it is the Holy Spirit who is sent to dwell within us ... it is the Holy Spirit to make us one with divinity. This Spirit given us is the way Jesus remains with us *"always, until the end of the age."* We have the power ... to make disciples ... to baptize ... and to teach. We are Jesus' gift to others. But more importantly, we have the power to be the Presence of the Risen Christ through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit ... which is Jesus' gift to us. With the Holy Spirit, we can faithfully continue His ministry. The Holy Spirit transforms each one of us into being gifts for others.

We are like the disciples not only in our doubting, but also in that we have been given the power to continue the work of Jesus Christ. In a society in which healthy self-esteem is so difficult for so many people, consider what Jesus does for each and every one of us ... He gives us the power to continue His work and, even more, He remains with us, so we are His Risen Presence for others. How healthy should our self-esteem be! We carry within us the Holy Spirit ... the Risen Presence of Jesus Christ! How urgent our response needs to be. Jesus chooses us to continue His Presence ... to continue to be His saving mission in our world.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families be well and safe on this Ascension Day and always!




"Keep in mind the words of the Lord Jesus, who Himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive."" ~ Acts 20:35 ~

Acts 1:1-11 | Eph 1: 17-23 | Mt 28: 16-20

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Actions speak louder than words. How many of us have heard or said this exact phrase? I suspect most, if not all of us are quite familiar with this old adage. In fact, this is exactly what we are being told by Jesus himself in today's Gospel when he says, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations." Jesus continues his direction of *action* by telling us to baptize "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." We are not directed to simply speak about Jesus with our families and church communities, we are told to GO among all nations and add to Jesus' flock. We continue Christ's mission when we seek to spread his love. Before Jesus joined his Father in heaven, his instructions were very clear. This is an opportunity to think about the commission we were given as part of the baptized community, and how Jesus is asking us to take action in his name.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Easier said than done. We've all heard that one as well. It's hard to feel equipped to spread the word and the will of God. We worry our words will fail us and we will look foolish. We know we are not perfect, and wonder if that means we cannot possibly be Christ's hands and feet on this earth. However, today's reading from Ephesians provides us with the perfect prayer to give us hope and faith in the Holy Spirit as we set out to fulfill the Great Commission given to us in this week's Gospel: "May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a Spirit of wisdom and revelation resulting in knowledge of him." We are challenged to act for God, but not without being given the tools to do so with confidence.



PRAY Meditate on today's second reading from Ephesians. Read it as if your priest was giving you a blessing before you head out of your house each morning. Let it fill your soul with love and awe for our Father, and let it give you the confidence you need to play an active role in building his kingdom until he comes again.

Ascension on Sunday

THE ASCENSION of the Lord, which traditionally falls on a Thursday, may be celebrated on a Sunday in certain parts of the world.

The Ascension originated as a Thursday celebration because of the story of the event from the opening of the Acts of the Apostles. There, Luke says that Jesus rose from the dead, appeared to believers for forty days and then ascended to the heavens. Even though the accounts of the Ascension in the Gospels suggest it took place after a shorter period of time, the liturgy of the Church has honored the chronology from Acts by celebrating the Ascension on Thursday of the sixth week of Easter.

The Solemnity of the Ascension is one of ten days that may be a holyday of obligation. Not all countries have the same holydays. In those countries where the Ascension is not a holyday, the solemnity is transferred to the following Sunday. The United States is so large and its needs so varied that Rome has granted it permission to decide by region on the date of this one solemnity. It is possible within the United States for Ascension to be on a Thursday in one state and on a Sunday in another. Travelers are expected to honor the custom of the place where they are that week.

Those celebrating Ascension on Sunday will miss the Mass texts of the Seventh Sunday of Easter, filled with anticipation for the Spirit of Pentecost. The Second Reading and the Gospel of the Seventh Sunday of Easter may replace those usually heard on the Sixth. Those attending weekday Masses may notice that the Responsorial Psalm on Friday and Saturday of the Sixth Week of Easter is a seasonal psalm for the Ascension, even if their community will not celebrate the solemnity until Sunday.

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
