Dear Parishioners,

Breath means life. In case of a heart attack or drowning, the first thing a responder ought to do is to begin cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR), an emergency measure intended to keep oxygen flowing through the victim's system so the brain keeps functioning. If the victim begins breathing again on his or her own, we are overjoyed that the person has a new lease on life, is given a second chance ... hasn't used up their "nine lives." Yes, breath means life. Breath is precious. Breath enables us to be. In this weekend's Pentecost Gospel, Jesus breathes new Life into His disciples. This breath-life is the Holy Spirit, the Advocate, the Paraclete, a divine Person who recreates us into someone entirely new.

In Saint John's Gospel, Pentecost takes place on Easter evening. The giving of new Life on Easter and the giving of the Spirit on Pentecost coalesce in the one Body of Christ ... the Church. Something entirely new has happened. The Body is being sent forth, the breath of new creation, the power of forgiveness. Each day when we – Christ's Body ... the Church – allow the Holy Spirit to work in and through us, Easter-Pentecost happens anew. Each day when we open ourselves to the breath-life of the Holy Spirit, we ourselves are made anew. There is no end to the new Life that the risen Jesus and His Spirit breath into us. There is no end to our re-creation in the Spirit, in the Body of Christ.

Being the risen Christ's Body, the Church, means that our new Life in the Spirit binds us into a community. But unfortunately ... sadly, sometimes we do not live in accordance with the identity we've been given. No wonder Jesus links the sending of the Holy Spirit with the commission to forgive sins! Forgiveness heals the breach between two persons or groups. Forgiveness heals the divergence of lives. Forgiveness ensures that we remain "one Body" in Christ (Second Reading). The only way we can share risen Life is that there can be no breach among us — "whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons" (Second Reading). Forgiveness, then, stands as a bounden duty for those sharing in risen Life. This forgiveness is about building right relationships. It's about opening doors between ourselves and others rather than closing them. This forgiveness is about allowing the peace of Jesus Christ to replace the fears that stifle our connecting to one another. The risen Christ breathes into us the Spirit – this capacity to be new creations who forgive – and then He sends us out into the world to unleash this Spirit. Every day is Easter-Pentecost.

Pentecost is more than celebrating the "birthday" of the Church – it celebrates our "birth" into risen Life ("He breathed on them"; Gn 2:7, Jn 20:22) and being sent forth armed with peace to forgive others. We can speak of a "birthday" of the Church (the Church being the Body of Christ) only when we make the Church a reality through forgiveness of one another. Then every day is a "birthday" – a birthing of the risen Christ in each other. Forgiveness is the Church's CPR.

Forgiveness is sometimes the most difficult thing we do. So many simple acts in our everyday living demand that we seek and give forgiveness. This is why Jesus sent the Holy Spirit ... *to empower us* through the common risen Life we share ... *to forgive* ... *to heal* divisions in the community ... *to be peacemakers*. We overcome our fear and unlock the doors of our closed relationships when we reach out to others in forgiveness.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always! May you and your families be well and safe on this day of Pentecost and always! **Peace be with you!**

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

As a college student, I found myself sitting near the information desk during a layover at a German airport. This was in the days before mobile phones and Google Translate. I remember being so impressed that the two young women behind the desk were able to answer questions in so many languages without missing a beat. Whether it was Spanish, French, German or English, each traveler heard an answer in their own language. I often think that must have been what it was like for the travelers to Jerusalem during Pentecost. They were in an unfamiliar place and yet God spoke to them in a way they could understand. And the beautiful thing about the Pentecost story is that it is not just relating one single moment in time. Instead, it is the start of the Holy Spirit's ministry here on earth, and in our baptism, we, too, receive the same gift of the Holy Spirit. Confirmation completes the grace we receive at baptism, since we receive a "special strength of the Holy Spirit." (CCC 1285) We, too, are given the tools to go forth and speak to others even when we are afraid they may not understand. Let us remember St. Paul's words from the second reading: "To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit." And then let us go out and use those gifts for the greater glory of God.

GO EVANGELIZE PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS,

ACCOMPANIMENT

The idea of evangelizing is uncomfortable for many people. Sure, it was fine for the disciples to go out and start talking to strangers, but us? No way. However, evangelization doesn't have to mean starting conversations on the street (although it can!). Instead, it might be making the sign of the cross before a meal in a restaurant, mentioning Mass when a co-worker asks what you did over the weekend, or displaying a crucifix in your home where visitors will see it. In these small ways, we can encourage others to open the door for God to "shine within these hearts of yours," as today's Gospel Sequence says.

STUDY St. Paul reminds us today that we are all "baptized into one body" and "we were all given to drink of one Spirit." In today's divisive world, it can be difficult to remember that. Let us pray for one another knowing that all Christians – even those who may annoy us – are joined together in the same body of Christ. Specifically, have as your at-the-ready prayer this week for all circumstances, the following: Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.



As we move forward into spring, a season of renewal and rebirth, we continue providing assistance to those who come to our church seeking a helping hand. If you would like to help, you may leave your donations of nonperishable items in the Gathering Spaces of both Nativity and Saint Catherine of Siena churches, or you may deliver them directly to the pantry at the O'Meara Conference Center from 10:15 to 11:30a on Wednesday mornings.

Here are some suggested items: pasta, ramen noodles, instant potatoes, tuna, canned chicken (or other canned meats), rice, canned fruit, applesauce, crackers, peanut butter and jelly. Also, nonfood items such as soap, bathroom tissue, shampoo, toothpaste and toothbrushes are appreciated.

Pentecost

ON PENTECOST, we celebrate the day on which the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples in a form resembling tongues of fire, empowering them to proclaim the message that Jesus is risen from the dead. According to Acts of the Apostles (1:13–14), Mary, the apostles, and other disciples had been huddled together in an upper room after the ascension of Jesus. But on this day they went forth from that room as new people, alive in the Spirit, speaking in tongues and winning over believers by the thousands.

A few special features mark the Mass of Pentecost Sunday. The options for the First Reading for Saturday's Vigil Mass, for example, are taken from the Old Testament. Throughout the Easter season, all the readings come from the New Testament—except, of course, the Responsorial Psalm. Saturday's First Reading foreshadows the coming of the Spirit. On Sunday, the First Reading comes from Acts of the Apostles, and it tells the story of Pentecost. After the Second Reading, everyone sings or says the Pentecost Sequence, a special hymn that tells the meaning of this day.

If the priest uses Eucharistic Prayer I, he inserts a special phrase saying that this is the day "on which the Holy Spirit appeared to the Apostles in tongues of fire." The Mass concludes with a double "alleluia." The deacon or priest adds the words to his dismissal, and you answer, "Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia." This joyful acclamation concludes the Church's celebration of Easter.

The Paschal candle burns throughout the Pentecost Mass, as it does for the fifty days of Easter Time. After Mass, however, it is moved from its place near the ambo to a position in the baptistry.
