

As we spring forward into longer and warmer days, we continue to think of our neighbors here in Clayton and Franklin Township. If you would like to help by donating to our Parish Food Pantry, you may leave nonperishable items in the shopping cart located in the Gathering Space of Nativity Church, or, you may deliver them directly to the pantry at the O'Meara Conference Center from 10:15 to 11:30a on Wednesday mornings.. Since we cannot allow you inside the pantry at this time, there will be a bench outside the pantry on which you may leave your donations. You may honk your car horn before driving away to alert us of your presence so that we may retrieve the items.

Please, leave your food donations outside the pantry on Wednesday mornings only. We are sorry, but, food left out in the elements for an unknown number of hours or days when we are not present at the pantry or when the church is not open cannot be used safely and must be discarded.

All nonperishable items are appreciated including such things as canned vegetables, ramen noodles, rice, canned meats and stews, tuna, pancake mix, peanut butter and jelly. Also, nonfood items such as soap, toothpaste and toothbrushes are always welcome. If you prefer not to shop, monetary donations are great, too.

15 FAITHFUL DISCIPLE

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Come, Holy Spirit!" On Pentecost Sunday, which we celebrate 50 days after Easter, Jesus sends the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. The readings use the language of the senses to describe the powerful presence of the Spirit: A breath, a mighty wind, tongues of fire, a cacophony of languages somehow understood by all. Jesus sends the Spirit upon each of us as well. And while we may not experience the Holy Spirit with our physical senses, I bet each one of us has sensed the Spirit's presence at different times in life: a homily that deeply resonated, a sense of awe at God's creation, a "moral compass" that guided us toward what is right, or when we found the words to console a friend in crisis or vice versa. Just as the Spirit transformed the disciples and emboldened them to build up the Church by carrying on Jesus' mission, we, too, can ask the Holy Spirit to guide us and strengthen us to be a force for love and unity in our families, parishes, and communities.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's Gospel, Jesus sends his disciples out to continue his ministry, assuring them of the presence of the Holy Spirit to guide them. We, too, have been given the gifts of the Holy Spirit and commissioned to use them to build up the Church. Well before we learned about concepts such as "emotional intelligence" or skills tests, Saint Paul assured the Corinthians that there are many different gifts and ministries, but the same Spirit. Our gifts may even change as we move from one chapter of life to another. For example, high school and college students may help lead retreats or participate in service projects, young adults may build a parish website or lead a Bible study, those who are homebound may offer to pray for others in their parish. For followers of Christ, the only option not on the table is becoming complacent. As we move from the Easter season to "Ordinary Time," let's invite the Holy Spirit to show us how to be "extra-ordinary" in our discipleship in the coming days and weeks. Then follow through.

PRAY Do you sometimes get the Monday blahs? Try starting the day with the Prayer to the Holy Spirit, asking for guidance (and some pep in our step!) as we begin the week: Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.

Dear Parishioners.

In both accounts of creation in the Book of Genesis, we are reminded of the creating power of the breath of God. In the first account, "a mighty wind swept over the waters," (Gen 1:2) ... Ruah-Elohim, the Breath of God. In the second creation account, formed from the clay of the earth, the first humans were simply a lump of clay until the Lord God "breathed divine life into them" (Gen 2:7). God's breath makes us humans living beings. Life is a gift. It is the most precious gift we have. The tendency of living beings is to preserve life at all costs, fight for life, protect life, and celebrate life. The Solemnity of Pentecost is truly a celebration of life. But it is a celebration of more than our human life. It is a celebration of being created in the risen life of Jesus by the descent of the Holy Spirit upon us. It is the birthday of the Church.

Jesus breathes the Holy Spirit into the disciples and by doing so He recreates them. The life-giving breath poured forth at the dawn of creation is now the Spirit-breath, the very indwelling of God. Only because of this divine indwelling do we have the power to forgive and thus continue Jesus' saving mission. We are the incarnation of the risen Lord in our world today. We are re-created by the Holy Spirit. The sign of re-creation is <u>forgiveness</u>. The fruit of re-creation and forgiveness is <u>peace</u>. No wonder, Jesus, not once, but twice, greets the disciples with "Peace be with you." No wonder we humans long for lasting peace.

In Saint Paul's letter to the Galatians, the old order of creation and the effects of re-creation in Christ are contrasted. We are in need of Saint Paul's warning and insight to "live by the Spirit" as much as the Galatians were. Sinful humanity behaves wretchedly: "immorality, impurity, lust, idolatry," etc. Spirit-filled humanity, the new creation in the risen Lord, behaves splendidly and its fruits are desirable: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness," etc. The contrast between old and new creation is stark and clear. The demands of our re-creation are quite clear as well: "those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified their flesh ... [and] live in the Spirit." The new relationship we now enjoy in Christ is one of both intimacy (God dwells within us through the power of the Holy Spirit) and demand that (we are to live Gospel lives). By sharing in the very Life of the risen Christ through the Holy Spirit, we also share in Jesus' ministry of healing and forgiving ... of doing the Father's will and thus bringing to fruition the reign of God.

Pentecost has popularly and rightly been called the "Birthday of the Church." We greatly reduce the mystery of God's presence, however, if we understand this phrase to simply refer to the beginning of the institutional Church. Pentecost is our rebirth into new life as those re-created in the Holy Spirit. It is our celebration of being God's redeemed people who now share in the mission of the divine Son. This is the great mystery we celebrate on this festival. This is one of the reasons why the Easter season is a privileged time for celebrating Baptism ... for in Baptism we first receive the Holy Spirit and the new life that is ours as those who bear Christ's name and mission ("As the Father has sent Me, so I send you").

This Pentecost solemnity brings to a climax the fifty-day celebration of Easter. But we must be careful not to put away our Easter joy too quickly. Pentecost may be the end of the Easter season, but it is also a celebration of the beginning of new life in Christ. Rather than our Alleluias being over, they are just beginning! They bear fruit in the practical ways in our life that in the words of Psalm 104 "we renew the face of the earth!"

May Saint Michael the Archangel protect, defend, guide, and intercede for us always!




