

LIVING STEWARDSHIP

"... For His sake I have accepted the loss of all things and I consider them so much rubbish,

that I may gain Christ ..." ~ Philippians 3:8 ~

The first commandment says that we should not put other gods before the Lord. Living <u>Stewardship</u> by sharing all of our gifts our time in prayer, our talent in charitable works and our treasure to support the Church helps us keep God first in everything. It helps us from putting other gods before God. It helps us from becoming a slave to our possessions. It helps us to use our gifts for the glory of God and not for the glory of ourselves.



Dear Parishioners,

A common way parents often deal with misbehaving children is to put them in a "time out" corner where they can cool down and (in the case of older children) think about changing their bad behavior. Often, we adults need a cooling-down period as well when someone frustrates or angers us. We take a walk, turn on the TV, do something to occupy our minds. In the Gospel this weekend about the woman caught in adultery, Jesus seems to be giving the crowd who brought the woman to Him two (2) cooling off periods. The image used is that He "bent down" and He "wrote on the ground." He gave them time to think. Jesus turns the accusation away from the woman and toward her accusers, who were obstinate in their "test." "Let the one among you who is without sin ..."

A story that began with a deadly accusation ends with divine mercy. When the community's condemnation would have led the adulterous woman to death, Jesus' mercy leads her to new life. A story that begins with human testing of the divine ends with a divine invitation to repent. Where narrow focus on application of the law is an excuse for testing the faithfulness of Jesus to Jewish covenantal law, Jesus reveals a new order in which all are called to repentance and to an experience of divine mercy. Jesus' desire for us is not death, but new life.

The crowd brings before Jesus a woman caught in adultery, condemns her, and demands her life. Jesus doesn't condemn the woman. He does condemn her sin ("go and sin no more") and calls her to repent and to choose a new way of living. Lent calls us to the same kind of encounter with Jesus so that we face our own sinfulness, hear His invitation to embrace a new way of living, and make the right choice. Central to this weekend's Gospel is not simply the adulterous woman or even the crowd that comes to the realization of their own sinfulness. The central idea here is an encounter with Jesus who calls us to repentance and offers us divine mercy. We are often quick to condemn one another. Jesus, however, assures us, "Neither do I condemn you." We need only to acknowledge our sinfulness and turn towards God. This is repentance. It rests in divine encounter and results in truth ... our sinfulness, God's mercy, and the promise of new life.


This weekend's Gospel reminds us that we encounter Jesus at our own risk. In other words, we will be confronted with the truth of our own sinfulness. But encounter with Jesus also brings us hope ... in the confrontation and invitation to repent ... we are offered new life (see this weekend's First Reading).

Today we begin the last third of the Lenten season. Even if we haven't been all that faithful to our chosen Lenten practices, it isn't too late now to resolve to open ourselves to an encounter with Jesus so that we can approach Easter with a renewed spirit seeking life. Like the crowd of the Gospel, we often find it easier to focus on the sins of others rather than our own weaknesses. Also like the crowd, we can encounter Jesus and face the truth of ourselves. Lent is a time to encounter Jesus, turn from our sinfulness in repentance, and seek divine mercy. The remarkable good news of this weekend's Gospel is that by facing and repenting of our own sinfulness, we establish new relations with those around us. Acknowledgment of our own sins and how we have hurt others builds us into stronger members of Christ's Body.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!


5th Sunday in Lent April 3, 2022

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

During Lent, we hear familiar stories: the event of Jesus' transfiguration, the prodigal son, and today the woman caught in adultery. Each reveals an aspect of God's perfect love for us and a glimpse of how we can reflect that love toward others. In today's Gospel, the Pharisees once again are testing Jesus, saying the law demands that the woman caught in adultery be stoned. Jesus responds, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." What a perfect response to the Pharisees, and to each one of us when we focus on the faults of another. Jesus' words teach and challenge us to look more closely at the ways we judge others – by appearance, a social media post, political party, for example – and ask ourselves whether we are truly doing so out of love. Closer to home, we may be quick to point out our spouse or children's perceived faults, without acknowledging our own. Jesus invites us to look at others – and ourselves – with the eyes of mercy.



GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Every time we go out to dinner, my son makes fun of me for agonizing over the menu: "You always regret what you pick!" Indeed, regret can be a powerful emotion. Fortunately, the dinner dilemma requires only that I mooch off of my son's entrée. However, deeper regrets can bog us down and prevent us from moving forward in faith. Today's readings challenge us not to wallow in past mistakes, preconceptions, or bad habits. As we hear in Isaiah, "The things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new!" We hear this idea again from St. Paul, who writes of "forgetting what lies behind" and straining forward toward "the prize of God's upward calling, in Christ Jesus," In the Gospel, Jesus doesn't dwell on the past sins of the adulterous woman other than to say, "Go, and from now on do not sin any more." Fortunately, our Church offers an antidote to regret and sin in the sacrament of reconciliation. Whether it's been a month or a decade, what better time than Lent to return to this sacrament and experience God's mercy and forgiveness?
