

In March 2021, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced a new program to provide financial assistance to families for certain COVID-19-related funeral expenses incurred due to a COVID-19-related death. FEMA began accepting applications for Funeral Assistance on April 12, 2021 through a dedicated call center. The telephone number for the FEMA Funeral Assistance Program is 844-684-6333 | TTY: 800-462-7585. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday 9a to 9p Eastern Time.

To apply you must call FEMA. There is no online application. The person applying must be the individual who incurred the funeral expense for the deceased. Please understand that FEMA will NOT speak to any businesses like funeral homes or cemeteries. no online applications will be accepted.

Just a reminder that the Parish Food Pantry will be open throughout the summer months. If you would like to help by donating to the pantry, you may leave nonperishable items in the shopping carts located in the Gathering Spaces of both Nativity and St. Catherine of Siena, or, you may deliver them directly to the Pantry at the O'Meara Conference Center from 10:15 to 11:30a on Wednesday mornings. There will be a bench outside the pantry on which you may leave your donations. You may honk your car horn before driving away to alert us of your presence so that we may retrieve the items. Please, leave your food donations outside the pantry on Wednesday mornings only.

Dear Parishioners,

Grandparents take great delight in having their grandchildren over for a little while – but just a little while! They tease about spoiling the children rotten and then being able to "give them back." Without withholding their love, grandparents nonetheless give back to the parents the responsibility and demands of bringing the little ones to young adulthood. Giving life to offspring involves much more than biological life. Rearing healthy children requires immeasurable doses of love, not a small sprinkle of patience, and a good deal of guidance and discipline. Good parents' self-giving is endless. It is an icon of the self-giving addressed in the readings for the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ ... Corpus Christi.

The story from the book of Exodus describes how Moses sprinkled the blood of the holocaust on the people to seal the covenant between them and God. A holocaust was a whole, burnt offering. The animal was completely destroyed as a symbol of the total gift of those making the sacrifice. This "total gift" becomes so real in Jesus Christ and is precisely what we celebrate on this feast day. Christ offering His Body and shedding His Blood on the cross were total self-gift. Likewise, giving His Body and Blood to us in the Eucharist for our nourishment is total self-gift. Two kinds of self-gift, but there is one divine love celebrated in passing over.

"Eat the Passover." Jesus clearly places giving us His Body and Blood to eat and drink in the context of His ultimate passing over from death to life. His gift of the Eucharist is an ongoing expression of this total gift of self. Jesus' Passover is an expression of immeasurable and enduring love in Jesus' very self-giving. By giving us His Body and Blood, Jesus give us His life. His offering of Self to us is total and mediates a new covenant between God and us. This new covenant demands of us the same total self-giving.

We are to give of ourselves in total self-giving like Christ so that we "may receive the promised eternal inheritance" [Second Reading]. We who partake of Jesus' Body and Blood, then, also participate in His Passover. In the Eucharist, we both give over our lives and receive the fullness of Life. Yes, we celebrate with great joy His total self-gift ... Christ's ... and ours.

All the readings for this Solemnity direct our attention to the effects of Jesus giving His Body and Blood. His eucharistic self-giving establishes a new covenant ... "obtains eternal redemption" ... secures "the promised eternal inheritance" [Second Reading], and "is given for the sake of many" [Gospel]. In this way, the celebration of Corpus Christi is an eloquent summation of the Paschal Mystery we celebrated at Easter. The shedding of blood is Paschal – passing over – because it always requires a death, and in the history of salvation, death always brings new life. Thus the body broken and the blood shed, while commemorating death, also celebrates life ... His sacrifice becomes a gift ... His defeat becomes our victory ... His weakness is our strength ... His brokenness is our healing ... His Eucharist is our blessing.

As we share in Christ's Body and Blood, we surrender ourselves to be like Christ – a Passover lamb for our world today. For the most part, we don't need to look for opportunities for total self-giving. The circumstances of daily life generously present them to us. The difference is that followers of Christ see self-giving not simply in terms of an inconvenience that cannot be avoided, but as the means to the fullness of life. Jesus' self-giving as a new covenant of God's love is taken up by His disciples as a pledge of the fullness of life God offers us.

May Saint Michael the Archangel protect, defend, guide, and intercede for us always!

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ Ex 24:3-8 | Heb 9:11-15 | Mk 14:12-16, 22-26

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

It takes only a few moments of holding one's breath to realize how desperately we need oxygen to survive. If only we were always as cognizant and mindful of the importance of the Eucharist for the same reason! I, for one, confess to approaching the altar with fervent belief in the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Christ, but also at times doing so while distracted or not fully appreciative of the gift being given to me. But today's solemnity is a powerful reminder not to take the Eucharist for granted. It is the Church's formal and official homage to Jesus Christ who, "with his own blood" obtained for us eternal redemption. St. Thomas Aquinas offers this description of how wonderful, precious, and important the Eucharist is with the following words: "The only-begotten Son of God, wishing to enable us to share in his divinity, assumed our nature, so that by becoming man he might make us gods." (Opusc. 57, 1-4) Like the disciples on the night of the Last Supper, we, too, receive the body and blood of Jesus under the appearance of bread and wine. He dwells within us, intercedes for us, and through grace he transforms us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Spending time with our Lord at Eucharistic adoration is a profound opportunity to open our hearts to him. Just as we know that we cannot love others well if we don't love ourselves, likewise we cannot share the love of Christ with others well if we don't take time to allow Christ to enter our hearts and our lives. By taking the time to talk to Jesus and listen, we can, in turn, witness to his love to others. We can use this time to pray for a specific person, seek help with a personal dilemma, or ask the Lord to show us where we need repentance and conversion in our own lives so as to be more like him. The more we are conformed to Christ, the better we can bring Christ to the world.

In re The Diocese of Camden, New Jersey Case No. 20-21257 (JNP)

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT on October 1, 2020, The Diocese of Camden, New Jersey, (the "<u>Diocese</u>") filed for protection under Chapter 11 of Title 11 of the United States Code.

The Bankruptcy Court has established <u>June 30, 2021 at 11:59 pm</u> (prevailing Eastern time) as the deadline to file proofs of claim against the Diocese (the "<u>Bar Date</u>").

If you have a claim against the Diocese including, without limitation, a claim related to sexual abuse committed by any person connected with the Diocese, you must file a claim on or before the Bar Date with Prime Clerk, the appointed Claims Agent.

IF YOU DO NOT TIMELY FILE A PROOF OF CLAIM, YOU MAY FORFEIT YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE ON ANY PLAN OF REORGANIZATION AND TO SHARE IN ANY DISTRIBUTIONS TO CREDITORS IN CONNECTION WITH THE DIOCESE'S CHAPTER 11 CASE.
