

In March 2021, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced a new program to provide financial assistance to families for certain COVID-19-related funeral expenses incurred due to a COVID-19-related death. FEMA began accepting applications for Funeral Assistance on April 12, 2021 through a dedicated call center. The telephone number for the FEMA Funeral Assistance Program is 844-684-6333 | TTY: 800-462-7585. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday 9a to 9p Eastern Time.

To apply you must call FEMA. There is no online application. The person applying must be the individual who incurred the funeral expense for the deceased. Please understand that FEMA will NOT speak to any businesses like funeral homes or cemeteries. no online applications will be accepted.

Just a reminder that the Parish Food Pantry will be open throughout the summer months. Dear Parishioners,

For almost two (2) decades, Walter Cronkite, one of the most trusted anchors in American television history, signed off his nightly newscast with the famous line, "And that's the way it is." His familiar voice, his factual details, and his faithful courage all helped his listeners to believe. "And that's the way it is." It was his person who made the line memorable. It was his person who made the line believable. It was his person who entered homes each night for so many, many years.

"This is how it is." That's what Jesus is saying in the Gospel for the 11th Weekend in Ordinary Time. Not for two decades, but rather for over two millennia, we have heard this simple sign-off. Jesus, however, is reporting far more than the events of a day. He is reporting more than just facts. He is reporting the mystery of the "Kingdom of God." This Kingdom is not of this world, but it is in this world. It is divine presence, our growth, and eternal life. The Kingdom of God is the divine desire for our salvation. It is a call to us of obedience to God's will and it is a call to us for faithful discipleship. It is a call to us to live divine life even when we are still caught up in our own human life and events.

The Kingdom of God is a mystery, and so, Jesus cannot report it like facts, like events, like Walter Cronkite might report it. Yet, the Kingdom must be even more believable to us than the facts before our eyes and the facts which we live each day. As mystery, we understand God's Kingdom through the bits and pieces of our own living, but it remains beyond our clear comprehension. That is its richness.

Still, Jesus says in this Weekend's Gospel, "<u>This is how it is</u>." Yet there is no single way to describe the "Kingdom of God." Here Jesus uses two similar parables to teach us that the kingdom is realized in the intersection of our own work (planting the seed) with God's work (the mystery of life growing and bearing fruit). The Good News is that God's Kingdom is assured. The scattered seed of the first parable will yield a harvest. The tiny seed of the second parable will grow into a large plant.

Perhaps the kingdom must be sown with abandon because this is the only way the mystery can be realized. Our own work is undertaken without full understanding, but with the trust that God is nurturing life out of all we do. It doesn't matter if we do tiny things, things tiny like a seed, or earth-shaking things. What matters is that we take up God's work of planting life and cooperate fully with the divine plan to bring salvation to all.

Our cooperation with God is to simply be followers of Jesus. We are to live the Good News that Jesus taught us. We are to "walk by faith, not by sight." This means we say yes to God, yes to God's commands, and yes to God's direction for our lives. In our "yes," the Kingdom of God takes root in the soil of our hearts and in due time blossoms forth in the great harvest God intends. The Kingdom of God is presence, growth, and life. "This is how it REALLY is!"

This Weekend's parables of the seeds are comforting, because whether scattered seed or tiny seed, an abundant harvest and largeness of life will spring up. Even our tiniest acts of kindness ... a simple smile or hello ... bring forth life and make the Kingdom of God present. Our lifelong journey to live the Gospel makes the Kingdom of God present. God uses us followers of Jesus to make divine presence known. "And that's the way it is!"

May Saint Michael the Archangel protect, defend, guide, and intercede for us always!

UNITED STATES BANKRUPTCY COURT FOR THE DISTRICT OF NEW JERSEY

In re The Diocese of Camden, New Jersey Case No. 20-21257 (JNP)

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT on October 1, 2020, The Diocese of Camden, New Jersey, (the "<u>Diocese</u>") filed for protection under Chapter 11 of Title 11 of the United States Code.

The Bankruptcy Court has established <u>June 30, 2021 at 11:59 pm</u> (prevailing Eastern time) as the deadline to file proofs of claim against the Diocese (the "<u>Bar Date</u>").

If you have a claim against the Diocese including, without limitation, a claim related to sexual abuse committed by any person connected with the Diocese, you must file a claim on or before the Bar Date with Prime Clerk, the appointed Claims Agent.

IF YOU DO NOT TIMELY FILE A PROOF OF CLAIM, YOU MAY FORFEIT YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE ON ANY PLAN OF REORGANIZATION AND TO SHARE IN ANY DISTRIBUTIONS TO CREDITORS IN CONNECTION WITH THE DIOCESE'S CHAPTER 11 CASE.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Many years ago, I met someone whose attentive hospitality cast a seed in me that took root and enabled me to grow as a disciple of Jesus. At the meetings I attended with her, Sister Bridget would immediately greet everyone with a smile, outstretched hand, and, "Hello, I'm Sister Bridget; what's your name?" You couldn't help but feel at ease with her warm greeting, but it didn't end there. Throughout the encounter, she remained just as positive and as completely present as she had in the beginning. Just like the parable of the man scattering seed in today's Gospel, Sister Bridget didn't know how the seed of God's word would grow as she sowed it in her unique, joyful way. To her, maybe her graciousness was the smallest gesture. But the Lord allowed it to sprout and grow, yielding fruit and a bountiful harvest.



GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's Gospel verse within the Alleluia proclaims, "The seed is the word of God, Christ is the sower. All who come to him will live forever." By our baptism, we are called to continue the work of Christ, sowing the word of God in our world. This may seem an intimidating expectation for all of us who doubt that we have the expertise to "sow" God's word. But in today's Gospel, Jesus tells the crowds that the kingdom of God is like the smallest of seeds, that once sown, becomes the largest of plants. If we believe in Christ and "aspire to please him," God can use our smallest gestures to sow his word in the world. We may not see how our small acts of kindness accomplish this. But if we scatter these "seeds" out of love for God, we can trust they will take root, grow abundantly, and call others to "come to him [and] live forever."

INVITE What "seeds" of welcome can you scatter among those you encounter? Make your "random acts of kindness" regular, intentional acts that express God's love. As St. Thérèse of Lisieux said: "Miss no single opportunity of making some small sacrifice, here by a smiling look, there by a kindly word; always doing the smallest right and doing it all for love."


