

The Epiphany of the Lord January 5, 2020



Dear Parishioners,

I remember growing up and having January 6th come around. There are many good memories. In the Byzantine-Ruthenian Church, the church / Rite I grew up in, today is a major feast day. In the tradition of Epiphany, lots of water is blessed and our Pastor would begin his annual visits to every home in the parish, blessing each one with some of that Holy Water. We would anticipate his arrival in our home in Marlton sometime around January 13th. May people sometimes call January 6th, "Little Christmas" because it is the day the Orthodox celebrate Christmas ... many traditions still do. And if you're counting ... according to the song, January 5th is the Twelfth Day of Christmas. Over the past few years, people have calculated what the 12 gifts would cost ... and it has gotten more and more expensive ... or should I say lavish? ... because many of those gifts are pretty extravagant.

Today gives us reason to pause and to think about how awesome and generous God truly is. Today we consider God's generosity in offering us His Divine Presence. Think about it ... twelve days ago, we received a gift so lavish, that our response should be just as lavish ... maybe on the order of the gifts of the Wise Men ... the Magi ... gifts of gold, and frankincense, and myrrh. We all know that God has given each one of us many great treasures ... however, today we ponder two which are also profound mysteries of our faith ... the gift of the only begotten Son as the Divine Presence that dwells among us ... God Incarnate. The other gift is that each one of us are "members of the same body" ... as we hear today from the letter of the Ephesians. The awesome part of that is that by doing so, God gave us the power to manifest the Divine Presence for others. That's why our response can be and should be no less lavish ... that response should be the total gift of ourselves as we make the story real in our relationships with others. We make God present for those around us by how we act ... by what we say ... and by what we do.

At our Baptism, each one of us became "co-heirs" and "co-partners" in Christ. We were given an awesome gift and responsibility ... we are co-partners in Jesus' saving ministry. Clearly, seeing the revelation of Christ among us requires of us a unique kind of seeing. We do not "look at" the light ... we become the Light. We do not simply "see" the glory of the Divine Presence ... we become the glory of that Divine Presence. The challenge each of us possesses is to live our lives each day so that all of our actions and decisions reflect the goodness of the revelation that has been given to us. Bottom line: we must consistently cooperate with God's revelation of Divine Presence ... and as a result, "WWJD" or "What Would Jesus Do?" takes on a whole new level of meaning.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

Twelfth Night

Twelfth Night is the conclusion of the 12 days of Christmas ... the evening of January 5th.

Twelfth Night was a big time of celebration with people often holding large parties. During these parties, often the roles in society were reversed with the servants being served by the rich people. This dated back to medieval and Tudor times when Twelfth Night marked the end of 'winter' which had started on October 31st with All Hallows Eve (Halloween).

At the start of Twelfth Night, the Twelfth Night cake was eaten. This was a rich cake make with eggs and butter, fruits, nuts, and spices. The modern Italian Panettone is the cake that's most like the old Twelfth Night cake.

A dried pea or bean was cooked in the cake. Whoever found it was the Lord (or Lady) of Misrule for the night. The Lord of Misrule led the celebrations and was dressed like a king (or queen). This tradition goes back to Roman times. In later times, two tokens were put into the cake (one for a man and one for a woman) and whoever found them became the king and queen of the Twelfth Night party.

During Twelfth Night, it was traditional for different types of pipes to be played, especially bagpipes. Lots of games were played, including ones with eggs. These included tossing an egg between two people moving further and further apart ... drop it and you lose, and passing an egg around on spoons. Another popular game was "Snapdragon" where you picked raisins or other dried fruit out of a tray of flaming brandy!

The first Monday after the Twelfth Night feast was finished was known as "Plough Monday" as this was when farming work would all begin again.

In many parts of the UK, people also went wassailing (Christmas caroling) on Twelfth Night.

Twelfth Night is also known as Epiphany Eve. In many countries, it's traditional to put the figures of the Wise Men / Three Kings into the Nativity Scene on Epiphany Eve to celebrate Epiphany on January 6th.

It's also traditional to take your Christmas decorations down following Twelfth Night.

Twelfth Night is also the name of a famous play written by William Shakespeare. It's though it was written in 1601 or 1602 and was first performed on February 2, 1602 although it wasn't published until 1623.
