



Dear Parishioners,

Fairytales include three bears, three little pigs, and three witches. We say the third time is a charm. When we talk about a person and the life cycle, we talk about them in terms of their birth, their life, and their death (Christians should talk about a person's life, a person's death, and a person's resurrection.) The magi brought three gifts to the infant Jesus. Time is divided into the past, the present, and the future. And we could go on and on and on. Threes are all around us. Three's abound in Saint Matthew's account of Jesus' Passion as well. Judas is paid thirty pieces of silver for betraying Jesus (three times ten). Jesus takes His three favorite apostles, Peter and "the two sons of Zebedee" as He goes off to pray. Three times Jesus finds Peter asleep after He asks him to "keep watch with Me." One of the accusations against Jesus before the "chief priests and the entire Sanhedrin" is that He said He could rebuild the temple in three days. Peter denies three times that he knows Jesus. Jesus and two others were crucified on that first Good Friday. Jesus died at three in the afternoon. Pilate gave orders that "the grave bee secured until the third day." <u>But no one was prepared for what would happen on that third day!</u>

It is easy to hear only the negatives in the Passion accounts: Jesus is denied, betrayed, and unjustly judged. He is scourged, mocked, and crucified. Yet all through the Passion accounts there are signs of life, promise, and hope. The night before He was betrayed, Jesus gave His disciples a continuing memorial of His self-giving ... His very Body and Blood for our nourishment as the Sacrament of Life. He promised that He could rebuild the temple in three days, speaking of course about the temple of His own Body. He gave us everlasting hope that by not saving Himself, He saved each and every one of us.

This day – Palm Sunday – when we sing our hosannas and bow our heads in sorrow as we hear the Passion account for the first time this year, we begin the holiest week of our Christian year. It is no ordinary week, for we celebrate Jesus' unreserved self-giving. Holy Week brings before us the demands of self-giving. All of our daily living throughout the year reminds us that, ultimately, like Jesus, we must give ourselves over to God so that God might give us divine life.

We cry "Hosanna" this day, but unlike the people of the city of Jerusalem long ago, we do not need to ask, "Who is this?" This the one who models for us the mystery of life: die to self so that we might be exalted and raised to new life. This week we celebrate in pointed liturgies the meaning of our whole Christian living: dying to self so that God can raise us up, too. This dying can be as simple as setting aside the time to participate in all the Triduum (meaning "three days") liturgies or as demanding as entering into the depths of the Paschal Mystery by our own self-giving.

Perhaps this week we need to stop thinking about ourselves and our own needs first, ahead of others ... ahead of Jesus. Perhaps we must make Jesus the center of our lives instead of making ourselves the center of attention. Perhaps we need to calm down the frenetic pace of our own lives and cut some things out so that we can concentrate on loved ones more or help out those in need a bit more. Most importantly, this week should ultimately lead to new and deeper relationships and richer experiences. This is all new Life for us. This is what this week and the three days of the Triduum are all about

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

The Pontifical Good Friday Collection Some Information

Pilgrims are finally, slowly returning the Holy Places after two very difficult years that really put to the test the small and fragile Christian presence in the Holy Land. The challenges are not over yet. Pilgrimages are still far from pre-pandemic numbers and the current political situation, bringing new threats to the Christian community, make support of the annual Good Friday Collection for the Holy Land more needed than ever.

Each year, the Holy Father asks every Catholic parish around the world to take up a collection on Good Friday to keep a Christian presence in the Holy Land. The collection supports the work of the Franciscans in the sacred shrines, ministers to the parishes, provides formation and education in the communities and schools, and cares for the basic needs of people in the Holy Land. It also assists the Congregation for the Oriental Churches to sustain the Easter Rite Catholic Churches present in the region.

Bishop Sullivan and Father Hughes had the privilege of visiting a parish and school in Jericho on their pilgrimage in February 2023. The K-12 school serves 976 students – less than 70 of them are Christian. The Pastor, who also serves as Head Master, told us that more than 80% of the funding for his parish and school comes from the Good Friday Collection. The same is true in the Galilee, Nazareth, Cana, Bethlehem and Jerusalem.



As we begin Holy Week, we hear Matthew's account of the Passion. We see Jesus' humanity as he experiences sorrow and distress in the hours before his death. Three times, he asks the Father to "let this cup pass from me, yet, not as I will, but as you will." In our own human experience. I am guessing many of us have asked the Father to "let this cup pass" - for in addition to life's joys, we will all experience setbacks, struggles, and suffering. By example, Jesus shows us that we can turn to our Father, trusting in his will for us. Let this be a reminder in this holiest of weeks that we can bring our suffering and our doubts to the Father, knowing that the joy of Easter will come.


Easter Triduum

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The final words of today's Gospel [shorter version] are those of the centurion and the men keeping watch over Jesus: "Truly this was the Son of God!" Let us keep in mind this central proclamation of our faith while attending Triduum services this week. On Holy Thursday. we remember the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist and the priesthood, celebrating Christ's outpouring of love for us. On Good Friday we venerate the cross as we solemnly recall the passion and death of Jesus. And of course at the Easter Vigil and on Easter Sunday, we celebrate the story of our salvation, culminating in Jesus' resurrection. As Christians, we know that the cross will give way to the empty tomb and the promise of new life in Christ. Let our voices be strong this week as we echo the centurion's words above, and may Jesus' name be praised forever!

PRAY Praying the Stations of the Cross allows us to walk with Jesus through his passion and death. Make that journey with Jesus this week.
