As we spring forward into longer and warmer days, we continue to think of our neighbors here in Clayton and Franklin Township. If you would like to help by donating to our Parish Food Pantry, you may leave nonperishable items in the shopping cart located in the Gathering Space of Nativity Church, or, you may deliver them directly to the pantry at the O'Meara Conference Center from 10:15 to 11:30a on Wednesday mornings. Since we cannot allow you inside the pantry at this time, there will be a bench outside the pantry on which you may leave your donations. You may honk your car horn before driving away to alert us of your presence so that we may retrieve the items.

Please, leave your food donations outside the pantry on <u>Wednesday mornings only</u>. We are sorry, but, food left out in the elements for an unknown number of hours or days when we are not present at the pantry or when the church is not open cannot be used safely and must be discarded.

All nonperishable items are appreciated including such things as canned vegetables, ramen noodles, rice, canned meats and stews, tuna, pancake mix, peanut butter and jelly. Also, nonfood items such as soap, toothpaste and toothbrushes are always welcome. If you prefer not to shop, monetary donations are great, too.

PATHWAYS TO SUSTAINABLE LIVING

A four-part series based on *Laudato Si*, Pope Francis calls the Church and the world to acknowledge the urgency of our environmental challenges and to join him in embarking on a new path. This encyclical is written with both hope and resolve, looking to our common future with candor and humility.

This series begins the week after Earth Day (April 22nd) and concludes before the anniversary of *Laudato Si* (May 24th). Please join us for a four-part zoom series highlighting sustainable living presented by the Villanova University Sustainable Leadership Council Co-Chairs: Rev. Dr. Art Purcaro, OSA, Assistant Vice-President for Mission and Ministry and William Lorenz, Sustainable Engineering Director, Villanova College of Engineering.

CHRIST IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED!

"Selective hearing" is a phrase we sometimes hear. It means that we hear what we want, and "tune out" what we don't want to hear. Children have selective hearing when they can't hear a parent telling them to quit the computer game and to do their homework, but they hear the parent calling them to supper. Adults hear many "voices" in the course of a day, and choose which ones to pay attention to and which ones to tune out. In the Gospel this weekend, Jesus declares Himself to be the "Good Shepherd" whose flock must hear His voice. Moreover, we who hear His voice must follow it. Following Jesus, as the Gospel says, means that we must "lay down [our] life" for the sake of others. We can do this because the Good Shepherd has already done this for us.

In this Gospel parable, the hired man doesn't have a sufficiently deep or committed relationship to the sheep and so he runs away when danger comes. The good shepherd, however, is the one who owns the sheep and has much more at stake than the hired hand. The good shepherd is concerned about, cares for, and protects the sheep even to the point of laying down his life for those he is called to care for. Jesus requires of us disciples the same mission – to lay down our lives, too ... this phrase occurs five (5) times in the Gospel.

Shepherding, then, is serious business. It means that we cannot run away from danger like the hired man, but we must meet danger head-on for the sake of God's beloved. Because of the resurrection, we share in the new life of Christ. Our entry into this new life is dying to ourselves – laying down our own lives. Jesus proclaims that He is the "Good Shepherd," that His flock hear His voice, and that He lays down His life for them. In the context of the Second Reading, however, we are more than Jesus' flock: we are "children of God" who are to "be like Him." This means that we are not only sheep who hear our Good Shepherd's voice, but we are also to become shepherds ourselves. Transformed from sheep to shepherd, we take up the life He has laid down and take up His saving mission to shepherd others to new life.

Taking up Jesus' mission means that we actually adopt selective hearing as a way of life. Now, however, the selective hearing isn't a matter of following our own will or completing a task of our own liking. The selective hearing of Jesus' disciples is a sharpening of our hearing so that Jesus' voice is the guiding element in our daily living. By sorting through all the diverse voices we hear each day, and hearing in some of them the voice of Jesus, we know the fold to which we belong – "we are God's children now" (Second Reading). Hearing Jesus' voice, we willingly lay down our lives so that others can come to the same awesome truth ... a share in Easter life, the "love the Father has bestowed on us" (Second Reading).

Laying down our lives for the sake of others doesn't mean that we will be nailed to a cross. It does mean that we commit ourselves to "good deeds" (First Reading) such as caring for the sick, forgiving those who wrong us (last Sunday's Gospel), giving thanks and praise to God (Responsorial Psalm), loving others as God has loved us (Second Reading). We don't have to go out of our way to be good shepherds. We need only to relate as one filled with new life in Christ to those who come our way.

May Saint Michael the Archangel protect, guide, and intercede for us always.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I really feel for teenagers these days. It seems that today's kids face - if not more challenges than I did - at least many more ways those challenges can present themselves. The usual adolescent pressures present themselves in person, as always, but also now on the many forms of social media. For young people, and all of us, living as "children of God" is certainly not for the faint of heart! As our Psalm today says, we should place our trust in God - take refuge in him rather than in what others may think of us. Why? Because living as disciples of Jesus can fly in the face of cultural norms. After all, Jesus was the stone the builders rejected - who became the cornerstone! He and the apostles challenged the status quo and faced ridicule and rejection, and even death because of it. Still, they always did the right thing. That's hard, for sure. But Jesus, the Good Shepherd, laid down his life for us, and that requires a response. Discipleship calls us to serve others by doing the right thing so that God's kingdom will triumph over the kingdom of darkness.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

St. John told his community that "the reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him." The key to being a loving force for good in the world is humility, and looking to God, rather than how we are perceived on social media or the car we drive, for our identity and worth. Tackling our ego begins by taking stock of what we value and whose opinion (rightly or wrongly) matters to us. Once we have explored those troubled waters, we can absorb St. Teresa of Calcutta's advice: "Accept being slighted, forgotten and disliked. Be kind and gentle even under provocation." Our slow steady witness shines light into darkness. The consistent challenge of our Christian behavior, offered without judgment, will promote God's values in our families, schools, work, and neighborhoods. Our faithful witness allows God to work. Remember, God uses the stones that are rejected to become the cornerstone.

PRAY Pray for the Holy Spirit to strengthen you to live humbly. Then ask the Spirit to open the door for you to invite others to know the joy of living according to God's ways. In the meantime, pray the *Litany of Humility*. It will help train your ego to seek God's approval only.


