# Dear Parishioners,

Vulnerability opens us up to being wounded (from its Latin root *vulnus* "wound"), exposed, or harmed. I think it's safe to say that none of us likes to be in this situation. We all like to be in control, sometimes not only of ourselves, but also of others. This, we might think, is the best protection for us. In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus is led into the desert. Here, Jesus spends forty days and forty nights fasting and praying. Yes, Jesus walked every aspect of our human journey, even submitting Himself to temptation and death. At the end of His desert experience, He would have been hungry. He would have sought companionship. If He were like me or you, maybe He would have wanted a shower and a haircut. After forty days in the desert, Jesus was vulnerable ... was ripe for temptation ... was ripe to be led where under other circumstances, He might not have gone. So the devil was smart. He knew how to hit Jesus where He was most vulnerable. He tried to pull Him with tantalizing temptations.

This Gospel story teaches us that temptation comes most surely when we are most vulnerable. It is essentially an enticement to put our own desires and needs first, to do what we think is best for ourselves at the moment, to give in to our impulses without considering too seriously the consequences. It is thinking our ourselves first. Resisting temptation, then, is really a matter of resisting self-centeredness. Like Jesus, we must choose instead to surrender ourselves to God who alone should be the center of our lives. To make any other choice is to choose a false god. This First Sunday of Lent forces us to consider this question: **Do we serve god or God?** 

With every temptation, we learn through our struggle with good and evil exactly how vulnerable we are. We learn how much we are tempted to serve all the false gods of our personal desires and needs. We also learn, interestingly enough, to fight temptation with temptation – to replace a desire for something that leads us astray with a stronger desire that leads us to serve our loving and merciful God alone. Only in a metaphoric desert can our vulnerabilities become ones that bring us to right relationships with God, ourselves, and others. We begin Lent with a reflection on temptation and false gods, hoping that Lenten penance helps us to overcome our vulnerabilities and come to Easter ready to receive the new, risen Life this season offers.


We are never immune to temptation. It is real. Temptation always brings choice, decision, and greater self-knowledge. Thus, Lent is a time for us to grapple with the vulnerabilities and inevitable temptations in our own lives and how they shape our self-knowledge. Good choices help us conform more perfectly to Christ and help us to be faithful to our baptismal identity as Body of Christ. Sinful choices and giving into temptations that lead us to false gods sidetrack us on our salvation journey and weaken our identity as Body of Christ.

Penitential practices proper to Lent are not about suffering for the sake of suffering. Instead, they are meant to expand us beyond self-preoccupation to new self-knowledge that leads us to deeper love for God and greater concern for the good of others. Lent is a time of conversion, a time when we become more perfectly who we are – the Body of Christ. This is Lent's challenge and invitation ... to replace vulnerabilities with strength and temptations with grace.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

# LENTEN REGULATIONS

- The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are <u>Ash</u>
   <u>Wednesday</u> and <u>Good Friday</u>. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.
- On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted. Those
  who are between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.
- On a day of **Abstinence**, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of Abstinence.
- The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence "substantially" (in other words, as a whole) is a serious obligation.
- The Fridays of the year outside of Lent are designated as days of Penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as Penance.
- The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (your Easter Duty) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, February 26, 2023 to the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, June 4, 2023 [The Paschal Precept is to receive Holy Communion during the Pascal Season. To receive Holy Communion, one must not be conscious of any grave sin. If you are conscious of grave sin, prior sacramental confession is needed. (Please see "Guidelines for the Reception of Holy Communion" in the Breaking Bread Missalettes in church, page 319, "For Catholics" 1996, USCCB.)



# GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Superbowl Sunday was two weeks ago, and many of us were more likely interested in the commercials than the actual game. After all, companies pay a ton of money to have their products paraded in front of us, and - in theory at least - take the time to make these particular ads memorable and funny. If we can be convinced that we will be better people, or our social outings greater and filled with more laughter, we will buy what they are selling. It's the modern version of the words of the serpent in today's first reading: if you eat this, "you will be like gods"! Today's readings are a reminder that we are all sinners and burdened by being vulnerable to false promises - but also that we are relieved of this burden through one man: Jesus Christ. If we tend to forget that the most important part of our salvation story is that it is full of more grace and forgiveness than we can comprehend, this first Sunday of Lent is a good time to prayerfully ponder this. If God seems far away or distant, let us recall that he loved us so much that he breathed our very life into us, and then gave his only begotten Son to us that we might have life eternally. All he asks in return is for us to accept this gift and follow in his footsteps. Lent is the time to be mindful of grace-filled opportunities that draw us closer to God.

# GO EVANGELIZE

# PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Let's think about these 40 days. In addition to allowing us to grow in understanding of God, this time is also an opportunity to grow in our understanding of how we can be the hands and feet of Jesus in the world and help to build the kingdom right here and now. How can we keep God at the center of our lives and resist worldly temptations to push him aside? Perhaps today's psalm can help us here: Ask for God's mercy, acknowledge our offenses, seek a "clean heart," renew a "steadfast spirit" within us, and ask God to grant us a "willing spirit" to give him praise. And remember Christ's words from the Gospel: Depend on "every word that comes forth from the mouth of God," which is love and mercy.

**PRAY** Pray today's psalm: "Give me back the joy of your salvation, and a willing spirit sustain in me. O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth shall proclaim your praise."
