

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

There are very few things in this world that are perfectly united, though many attempts have been made, think peanut butter and chocolate, Batman and Robin. But there is one example, and that is the Blessed Virgin Mary is perfectly united with Jesus' life and redemptive work. Though fully human, she is completely without sin - she is, as we pray in echoing God's angel, "full of grace." Thus she shares, as we do, in Christ's heavenly destiny but with an immediacy that we do not have. Upon her death she was instantly assumed into heavenly glory, body and soul, as the first of all the faithful who will eventually join with Christ in eternity upon death and purification. In celebrating this great Solemnity, the Church celebrates what lies ahead for those of us who imitate Mary's total trust in God. She had complete faith in God and his promises, and is a living example of the power and generosity of our God. We can follow her lead, engaging in a life of witness (proclaiming God's greatness) and gratitude (have a rejoicing spirit) for the sake of the world.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Sometimes, when hearing or talking about Mary's fiat, I first see it as a "yes" in modern, human terms. "Yes, I'll serve on that committee." "Yes, I'll organize that party." "Yes, I'll stay late to finish that project." It doesn't take long for our little "yesses" to turn into an adamant "Nooooooooo," also known as burnout. Thankfully, Mary's yes was far more than just an acquiescence to a small request - it was the commitment of her entire self to the choice God had placed before her. And she was rewarded with a special seat in heaven near her Son. In today's Gospel, Elizabeth immediately recognizes the true meaning of Mary's fiat: "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled." What can we learn from Mary's example? We can learn trust. We don't need to sign up for every volunteer opportunity (though volunteering is a great and worthwhile thing to do), but we can say "yes" to what God is asking of us according to the gifts and graces he has given us. Through daily prayer and seeking the intercession of Mary and Jesus, we can grow closer to the Lord and prepare ourselves for the day we meet Jesus and Mary face to face.

PRAY A lot of misunderstanding surrounds Catholic devotion to Mary. We do not worship Mary - that is reserved for God alone. Yet we do revere her and honor her unique and important role in God's saving plan. Pray the Magnificat or the Rosary, paying close attention to their scriptural foundation and what was happening in the "stories" within those Scriptures.

Just a reminder that the Parish Food Pantry will be open throughout the summer months. If you would like to help by donating to the pantry, you may leave nonperishable items in the shopping carts located in the Gathering Spaces of both Nativity and St. Catherine of Siena, or, you may deliver them directly to the Pantry at the O'Meara Conference Center from 10:15 to 11:30a on Wednesday mornings. There will be a bench outside the pantry on which you may leave your donations. You may honk your car horn before driving away to alert us of your presence so that we may retrieve the items. Pelease, leave your food donations outside the pantry on Wednesday mornings only.

Nonperishable items such as **ramen noodles**, **canned fruit**, **applesauce**, **canned vegetables**, **rice**, **crackers**, **coffee**, **peanut butter and jelly** are currently needed. Also, nonfood items such as **soap**, **toothpaste and toothbrushes** are also welcome. If you prefer not to shop, monetary donations are great, too.

Dear Parishioners,



Journeys that we plan have a beginning and an end. We prepare, we leave, we reach our destination, we do what we journeyed to do, and then we return home. Journeys we plan are like circles – more often than not, we come back to where we began. The Gospel for the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary describes a planned journey. "Mary set out." However, her journey extended far beyond traveling to her cousin Elizabeth to help her in her need. Its duration was actually Mary's lifelong journey of praising God, of allowing God to do great things through her, of showing how God is turning the order of things upside down, and of being an instrument of God to keep the divine promise of salvation.

Sacred Scripture doesn't give us very much information about Mary, but from what little is revealed, we do get glimpses of what her lifelong journey was like. She conceived and gave birth to the Son of God, the One, who even in the womb, caused the unborn John the Baptist "to leap for joy" in his mother, Elizabeth's, womb. She searched for the twelve-year-old Jesus until she found Him in the Temple ... in His Father's house. She was with her Son at the beginning of His public ministry in Cana and all during it. She stood beneath the cross. At times, it seems as though much of her lifelong journey was one of sorrow. Still, her **Magnificat** is marked by an attitude of praise, awe, and wonder at the things God is doing for her and for all of humanity.

Today, on the Assumption, we celebrate the completion of Mary's journey, when she "returned to her home," being taken body and soul into heaven to be forever with her Lord, whom she bore in her womb. Mary's journey comes full circle – she began her life united with God ... she was conceived without sin, in perfect holiness and she concludes life by once again being united with Godin heaven.

Mary is blessed because she said **yes** to God's invitation to place herself at the disposal of the Divine Will. Mary is blessed because her body gave life to the Word Incarnate. This is why we believe that her body is assumed into heaven: hers was a uniquely blessed body. Mary had the singular privilege of nourishing the Lord with her body. Body and soul, she was assumed into heaven to enjoy eternal Life with the divine Word. *Why?* Because she said "yes." Not just once to the Archangel Gabriel. Not just to Elizabeth's need. She said "yes" to God throughout her lifelong journey, a yes that rings out through the centuries into our own hearts, reminding us that our own lifelong journey must be like hers: responding to God with **our** yes, with our praise, with our awe and wonder at the great things that God is doing through each one of us. When our life journey parallels Mary's journey of fidelity, then we, too, come "home."

Our own "yes" to God must be so strong that self-giving defines our own lifelong journey as it did Mary's. Sometimes self-giving is seen in only a negative, death-dealing sense. And yes, sometimes, self-giving does involve a dying to self. The Gospel of this Solemnity reminds us that there is joy in self-giving as well. The joy that comes from seeing the suffering of another lightened, or a smile brought to the face of someone who is lonely, or the peace of little ones tucked safely into bed for the night is an incarnation in the midst of our self-giving. Our self-giving unfolds in the simple events of our days that embody our own yes to God, which in turn overflows into our own *Magnificat*. Self-giving defines the lifelong journey that brings us "home" to be with Mary and her divine Son forever.

May Saint Michael the Archangel protect, defend, guide, and intercede for us always!



Cost: \$140 per person (includes program, lodging, and meals; single rooms only.


