

Rita of Cascia was born in the town of Roccaporena in the province of Umbria, Italy. Rita lived from 1381 to 1457, was married, and raised two sons. After the murder of her husband, she urged forgiveness rather than the customary vendetta. She was denied entrance to the Augustinian convent because of the threat of violent revenge by her husband's relatives. Through her intercession, a promise of forgiveness and peace was secured, and she began forty years of austerities, contemplation, and service to the sick and poor. Towards the end of her life, she bore a wound as from a thorn after having heard a sermon about the Crown of Thorns.

It is said that near the end of her life Rita was bedridden at the convent. While visiting her, a cousin asked if she desired anything from her old home. Rita responded by asking for a rose from the garden. It was January, and her cousin did not expect to find one due to the season. However, when her relative went to the house, a single blooming rose was found in the garden, and her cousin brought it back to Rita at the convent. St. Rita is often depicted holding roses or with roses nearby. On her feast day, churches and shrines of St. Rita provide roses to the congregation that are blessed by the priest during Mass.

Rita has acquired the reputation, together with Saint Jude, as a saint of impossible causes. She is also the patron saint of sterility, abuse victims, loneliness, marriage difficulties, parenthood, widows, the sick, bodily ills, and wounds.

Rita's body, which has remained incorrupt over the centuries, is venerated today in the shrine at Cascia, which bears her name. Many people visit her tomb each year from all over the world.

Please, leave your food donations outside the pantry on Wednesday mornings only. We are sorry, but, food left out in the elements for an unknown number of hours or days when we are not present at the pantry or when the church is not open cannot be used safely and must be discarded.

All nonperishable items are appreciated including such things as canned vegetables, ramen noodles, rice, canned meats and stews, tuna, pancake mix, peanut butter and jelly. Also, nonfood items such as soap, toothpaste and toothbrushes are always welcome. If you prefer not to shop, monetary donations are great, too.

The Ascension of the Lord May 16, 2021







Dear Parishioners,

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, the account we heard in today's Gospel: Then the Lord Jesus, after He spoke to them, was taken up into heaven and took His seat at the right hand of God. We celebrate knowing that where Jesus has gone, He is enabling us to go as well.

On July 20. 1969, Neil Armstrong, the first man to walk on the moon, famously said, "One small step for man, one giant leap for mankind." Although that step out of the spaceship was just one small step for him, it had amazing significance for the human race. Neil Armstrong walking on the moon meant that it was possible for others to walk on the moon.

As astonishing as Neil Armstrong's action was, Jesus' Ascension into heaven is what truly has significance for all of humanity and creation. Through the fall of Adam and Eve, all of mankind was separated from God. But through Jesus' Life, Passion, Death and Resurrection, He paid the price for sin and enabled us to be in union with God through Him. Through the Ascension, Jesus has made it possible for sinners like us to enter heaven and abide in God's presence. Just as Neil Armstrong overcame limits, which allowed man to walk on the moon, so has Jesus overcome death allowing us to reach heaven.

But this is no easy journey. Just as Neil Armstrong went through training, so do we need to be trained. We need to be formed as disciples of Jesus Christ. In doing so we become more like Him and become more and more able to enter the glories of heaven. There is no chance we could ever accomplish this on our own – but we are not alone. Jesus has gone before us to show us the way and sent us the Holy Spirit to be our Helper and Paraclete.

It is the Holy Spirit who enables us to follow the command Jesus gives us before He ascends in today's Gospel: *Go into the whole world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature.* We are His disciples, and He has shown us the way. Let us follow Him with joy and thanksgiving.

May Saint Michael the Archangel protect, defend, guide, and intercede for us always!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Why are you standing there looking at the sky?" the Apostles are asked. Well, hello! The risen Jesus, who had once again walked among the Apostles, "was lifted up, and a cloud took him from their sight." Of course the disciples would look up, to gaze once more upon the Son of God whom they loved. Today's feast reminds us, however, that to look for Jesus is not to stand around looking up, but to engage with others in the world in which he remains present. Even as he sits "at the right hand of God," Jesus dwells among and within us. For God is not some distant figure, but One who desires to walk alongside us in the person of his Son, Jesus, and give us the gift of the Holy Spirit as our help and advocate. Even in times when we experience doubt, complacency, or simply feel distant from God, Jesus is at our side. Once we open our hearts to his presence, we cannot help but share the Good News of God's love in our families, workplaces, and everyday encounters with others.

GO EVANGELIZE PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

For anyone wishing to grow in their understanding of what evangelization looks like, today's readings offer as good a playbook as any. As we celebrate the Ascension, we may be tempted to see it as a kind of "farewell party" for Jesus. But while on the surface, it may appear that Jesus "left" the Apostles, he promises to remain with them through the gift of the Holy Spirit. What does that mean for us? Today's Gospel sums it up, quoting Jesus' words immediately before he was taken up to heaven: "Go into the whole world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature." As Catholics and Christians, that's our bottom line. I read somewhere that "proclaim" goes beyond mere words, and encompasses living out the Gospel by sharing God's love. Jesus remains at our side, encouraging us to use the gifts God has given us to build up the Church.

PRAY Today's feast reminds us that we have an advocate in Jesus and the Holy Spirit. As you enter a challenging situation or even just a typical day, remember to ask Jesus to give you a "spirit of wisdom."
