STEWARDSHIP GRATITUDE

"I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans to give you this land as a possession."

~ Genesis 15:7 ~

Just as the Lord gave Abraham, Moses and the Israelites a land to possess, He has also given each of us a home. Whether your home is grand or humble, it is a gift from God. Abraham prepared a great sacrifice to the Lord in gratitude for the home God gave him. How do you show in your <u>Stewardship</u>, gratitude to God for the home He has given you? Do you make a sacrifice of any kind? Do you return any of your finances to God, investing equally in your eternal home just as you invest in your earthly home?



Dear Parishioners,

Most of us live far too hectic lives – we are busy from morning to night with work, chauffeuring the kids, cleaning, meals, answering e-mail, and a hundred other things. When we might finally sit down in the evening to relax a little, we often doze off while reading or watching a TV program. We might wake with a start when the book drops out of our hand, or wake up when a commercial comes on with its louder volume to find we missed half the TV program. Peter, James, and John in this weekend's Gospel must have really been tired after their climb up the mountain, for they fell asleep. Then they awaken to see Jesus' transfigured glory. How startling that must have been for them!

Saint Luke's account of the Transfiguration event is the only one that includes the necessity of the Passion on the journey to glory ("His exodus that He was going to accomplish in Jerusalem"). Peter awakens from sleep to see Jesus' glory and wants to stay there ("it is good that we are here; let us make three tents"). But he did not know what he was saying. To share in the glory of Jesus, disciples must walk the journey of Jesus: offer their very lives for the sake of others. These three Apostles were privileged to awaken from sleep to see Jesus' transfigured glory. But they clearly missed the most important point – this transfigured glory foreshadows His risen glory. Saint Luke's insight is that glory presupposes embracing Passion.

Jesus' Transfiguration – in all its glory – cannot erase the stark reality of self-offering. Simply put, glory comes only through embracing the Passion. This is the paradox of the Paschal mystery: that something as desirable as a share in Jesus' transfigured glory only comes through our embracing something as demanding as dying to self for the good of others. Even in this glorious moment of Transfiguration – which gives us encouragement and hope on our Lenten journey – we are reminded that the only way to remain in that glory is to die to self. We have to come down off the mountain and walk our own journey through death to glory.

Baptism is our covenant with the Lord. Rather than animal offerings and "smoking fire pot and flaming torch" (this weekend's First Reading), the sign of our covenant with God is water, chrism, a white garment, and a lighted candle. Saint Luke's allusion to Jesus' death in Jerusalem prompt an allusion to our being plunged into Jesus' dying and rising in the baptismal waters. We are invited this weekend to see our Baptism in light of the Transfiguration.


Baptism isn't simply a ritual we perform, but a covenant with God that we live out the rest of our lives. During Lent we prepare to renew our covenant with God at Easter. This means we not already share in God's life and look forward to that day when we will share eternal glory with God, but we also embrace the suffering and death of Jesus during His Passion.

Let's face it ... constant dying to self gets tiresome! This weekend we are given a glimpse of glory to ease the discouragement of a lifetime of self-emptying. This tells us something about how we might keep the Lord's Day holy. If each Sunday were a day of rest, a time to be good to ourselves, to do something special that is uplifting, to enter into a moment of glory, we would be better fortified and equipped to continue dying to self.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!

A Reflection on the Parts of the Mass ... (continued)

****** Homily Length


MANY PREACHERS are judged by the length of their homily. People may not say much about the content, but they will talk about the minutes. The length of a homily varies considerably. Many last from ten to fifteen minutes. A bishop usually goes longer. At daily Mass, a homily is shorter.

Catholic liturgical laws say nothing about the length of a homily. The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* refers several times to the homily, but it mentions "short homily" only once—and that is in reference to funerals (382). The introduction to the *Lectionary for Mass* says rather cryptically that a homily should be "neither too long nor too short" (24).

In the structure of the Catholic Mass, the homily is not as important as the biblical readings or the Eucharistic Prayer. Its length pertains not just to its content, but also to its role in the entire celebration. Mass is more than a homily with some ceremonies before and after. The homily plays a more subdued role: It offers an exhortation on the spiritual life and prepares people for the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

However, in many other Christian churches, the preaching is the centerpiece of the gathering. Sometimes called "the sermon" or "the message," the preaching is considerably longer than what Catholics typically experience because it plays a more central function in the service. Consequently, some Christians complain that the Catholic homily is too brief.

In the Catholic liturgy, the reading of Scripture takes precedence. It is a sacramental moment. "When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in his own word, proclaims the Gospel" (GIRM, 29). The rest is commentary, no matter how short or long.
