#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today we have blogs and life coaches, Facebook groups and self-help books, all of which can help us become better human beings. These resources come to mind as I read St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians - I think St. Paul would be the ultimate life coach! All of his letters to the early Church offer wisdom, encouragement, and instruction, and the words we heard today are particularly significant as we prepare for Jesus' coming this Advent: "the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus." Unlike some of our modern-day resources, Paul's words go beyond simply helpful advice; they are rooted in faith and prayer, and in the truth of the Paschal Mystery. These words assure us that we are not alone on our journey, that what God has promised in the person of his Son will come to fruition: Christ will come again! And so, as John the Baptist did, we who are disciples are meant to witness to his coming, announcing the Good News and preparing for his - second - coming. Repent. Believe. "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths." How do we do this? Engage with Scripture - read it and really hear what the Word of God is saying to you. Pray for insight, that the grace of God might transform you to go forth and announce the Gospel.

ACTIONS Re-read today's Gospel, and then consider how Saint Paul followed in John the Baptist's footsteps in his Letter to the Philippians. Think of ways you, like John and Paul, can encourage one another, and be a voice crying out in the desert. Participate in the sacrament of reconciliation and pray that God may cleanse your heart to welcome him at Christmas, and when he comes again.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Even pre-Google, I spent more time than perhaps I should have hunting down the perfect gifts, especially for my young boys. I'd scour the ads, then get up early on Black Friday and hit the stores in search of deals and hard-tofind items. Perhaps that's why these words from St. Paul stopped me in my tracks: "And this is my prayer: that your love may increase ever more and more in knowledge and every kind of perception, to discern what is of value [italics added1, so that you may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ." During Advent, these words can both assure and challenge us - to grow in love, knowledge, and a sense of what really matters during our time on earth. For me the challenge will be to spend less time shopping this season and more time focusing on deepening my relationship with God, who is preparing to turn the darkness into light. This doesn't mean we can't take delight in finding that perfect gift; but we ought also to increase our recognition that all gifts come from God, including our ability to have access to and means to purchase material gifts. We can find joy in God's presence (and presents?) among us.



## Dear Parishioners,

Saved by the bell! ... The firefighter saved the baby from sure death ... The relief pitcher saved the game ... We hear the word "save" frequently in our everyday chatter and know what it means: to be rescued from a bad situation, from danger, from an unwanted outcome. This weekend's Gospel doesn't use the word "save," but instead "salvation." What does it mean to "see the salvation of God" that Isaiah the Prophet foretold? Here the meaning of "save" is not quite so straightforward. Much more is promised than being rescued. In fact, what the Gospel is about is not so much being saved <u>from</u> as being saved <u>by</u> and <u>for</u>.

John quite clearly tells us how we are saved: seek "repentance for the forgiveness of sins." We are to actively level out the mountains and valleys of our own lives. We are to "make straight" our relationship with God and with others. We sometimes don't understand nor are we aware of the critical importance of repentance and forgiveness in our relationships with each other, and how critical they are for our salvation. Baruch's prophesy of a glorious future was fulfilled when Israel returned from exile (First Reading and Responsorial Psalm). Isaiah's prophesy of future glory quoted in the Gospel ("all flesh shall see the salvation of God") is fulfilled when we return to God through repentance and forgiveness. "Repentance for the forgiveness of sins" is an essential requirement for us to "see the salvation of God." We are saved by the actions of God for putting on "the splendor of glory from God forever" (First Reading).

The salvation of God is progressively revealed in repentance (our work) and forgiveness (God's work). The meandering paths and winding roads of our lives are straightened, and the valleys filled, and mountains brought low when our lives are characterized by attitudes of repentance. To repent means to change one's mind ... to change one's life. This is how we reach the fulness that is promised. This is how we reach our true home. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength ... and you shall love your neighbor as yourself." By increasing our love for one another, by discerning "what is of true value," and by being "filled with the fruit of righteousness" (Second Reading). Our work of repentance is a matter of turning ourselves toward the God who embraces us in mercy and forgiveness and welcomes us home. Our work of repentance is our response to the word-invitation to "see the salvation of God." We are to hear the "Word of God" and to act on it. Do we? ... How well?

Let's be honest. It's not just the busyness of Christmas preparations now in full December fury that distracts us from our ongoing work of repentance and forgiveness. Every day of the year we tend to be distracted by mountains of work, paths of indecision, and valleys of doubt and fear. Like John the Baptist, we are to hear "the Word of God" that comes to us ... that challenges us to embrace a more God-like way of living ... that not only promises salvation but shows us the path to it.

Changing our lives to live more faithfully Gospel values is not easy. Nor do we ever get to a point in our daily living when we have arrived at the mountain top and no longer need to act on God's Word, change our minds about what is most important to us, open ourselves to God's forgiveness of our wrongdoing, and learn how we in turn are to forgive others. This is the path to salvation. It is not an easy one. But it is a rewarding one.

May Saint Michael the Archangel defend, guide, protect, and intercede for us always!


